Other Neighborhood News

City Commits to Review Alta Vista Traffic Concerns; BAT Lanes Remain

Thanks to everyone who participated in the discussion and attended the AVNA special meeting with VIA about the Green Line. The AVNA Board Resolution and your interest in this issue got the City's attention. According to the city's transportation department, an additional review of the Green Line's impact on traffic in Alta Vista will begin this fall. The city is funding \$10M to address traffic calming and other issues along the 12mile Green Line, although no promise of funding nor a timeline have been discussed.

Summit and Breeden and the area around Mark Twain are obvious focal points for additional study, but the Green Line could also affect other places in the neighborhood. Property owners on any street identified for potential traffic calming measures will be notified, and two-thirds of affected property owners will have to agree before any measure is implemented. The membership did not propose a vote that changed the resolution adopted by the AVNA Board (see the previous newsletter), though many good questions were asked. VIA's Green Line along the AV/MV stretch will comprise bus-only transit (BAT) lanes plus enhancements such as light timing, pre-pay, and raised curbs for faster boarding. Could the goals for the Green Line be achieved with these other improvements and no BAT lanes, which would reduce the likelihood of a ripple effect of cars through neighborhoods? This option was never evaluated, so we may never know.

Construction of the Green Line is now expected to begin in March. The AVNA Board is focused on the immediate next step of working with the City to consider traffic hot spots in Alta Vista.



No More Traffic Congestion on Agarita

The traffic congestion on Agarita during pickup and dropoff times at Mark Twain Dual Language Academy is no longer there, thanks to an email (and some additional change management efforts) from Principal Garcia to parents asking them to re-route to Summit or further north on Breeden. He may also put up a temporary sign at the west end of Agarita. AVNA board members, residents, and a representative from Beacon Hill and District 1 met with Principal Garcia to discuss short- and long-term solutions to expedite the carline. Over the years, Principal Garcia has explored many options and regularly works with neighbors to accommodate their parking and access needs. One solution might be to make Breeden a one-way during school hours. However, temporary one-way travel may be a thing of the past, as Principal Garcia was told before the pandemic that one-way streets in school zones are no longer allowed unless they are permanent. District 1 is looking into this, and AVNA will continue to work with Mark Twain to explore options.

Big Picture: More Walkability & Bike Lanes for Alta Vista

One big-picture vision for Alta Vista includes a bike network. Emily Hutcheson, a Mark Twain parent and representative of Beacon Hill who also attended the meeting with Principal Garcia, proposed this idea. The bike corridor would connect Mark Twain in Alta Vista and Cotton Elementary in Beacon Hill along parts of Summit and Magnolia. The proposed route turns down Flores to San Pedro Springs Park, which complements a longstanding vision held by many Alta Vista residents and association members to activate that stretch. The AVNA Board has committed to working with Beacon Hill and stakeholders on the next step of applying for a Bike & Walkability Workshop from the local metro planning organization.
